# Stations of the Cross Memorial Episcopal Church Bolton Hill Good Friday 2021

Bolton Hill is one of Baltimore's most historic and well-preserved neighborhoods. Today it is also one of its most diverse, with an almost 50/50 make-up split of black and white residents, as well as a tremendous amount of economic diversity - with low, moderate and luxury housing options in a four by five block area. It also has at least a hundred year legacy of segregation and racism dating back to its founding as a 'summer respite' from city living and a sanctuary for fleeing southern landowners after the Civil War. As the first Church in the Neighborhood, Memorial's legacy is closely tied to the neighborhood - with 7 of the first 8 Rectors having served in the Confederacy, and remaining a segregated congregation until the late 1960s.

While we all celebrate both our Parish and our Neighborhoods focus on diversity, social justice and inclusion - very few of us are aware of the breadth and depth of this history. Join us as we begin to explore this painful part of our past.

#### **FIRST STATION**

### JESUS IS CONDEMNED TO DEATH MEMORIAL EPISCOPAL BELL TOWER

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. By a perversion of justice, he was taken away, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth.

Jesus was condemned unjustly by those who did not understand him and by those who were frightened of what he did and said. Perhaps they sensed that this man could make a difference, that he could turn their world upside down.

Memorial Episcopal Church was founded in 1860. It is a Memorial to The Rev. Henry Johns and Charles Ridgely Howard, both slave owners and southern sympathizers. The Parish actively practiced segregation well into the 1960's. People are condemned because of the color of their skin, their gender, their beliefs, because they are born with a disability, because they don't conform to our way of thinking, the list is endless.



Let us pray.

Lord Jesus, though you were condemned to suffer and die, all judgment has been placed in your hand. Grant that we may be saved from all false judgments against our neighbor, and at the last may stand before you, forgiven by your great mercy, for the sake of your love. *Amen*.

Holy God, Holy and Mighty, Holy Immortal One. *Have mercy upon us.* 

#### **SECOND STATION**

#### JESUS TAKES UP HIS CROSS – MEMORIAL CHURCH RECTORY

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

The soldiers began saluting him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

Because of fear and hatred Jesus was condemned and mocked. Because of fear and hatred the Rev. Arthur Kelsey was forced out of Memorial when he sought to integrate the Parish in 1956. Despite both national and diocesan guidelines encouraging integration, and a significant financial grant to support reaching out to the Black community in Baltimore, the parish chose to attack and embarrass their rector and continue working to keep both the parish and the neighborhood segregated. Let us pray.

Mr. Briscoe stated that it was rumored that the Rector is associated th negro groups, and he wondered what the facts were.

It was predicted by Major Whitman that the admission of negroes to the congregation would result in the loss of one-third to one-half of the present congregation.

Mr. Passano opposed the possible destruction of the present parish, stating that the church cannot preserve the neighborhood on the one hand, and take the Mission to both races on the other. He advocated that the Vestry not take a formal stand, but secure an agreement on its policy.

### THIRD STATION JESUS FALLS THE FIRST TIME THE BOLTON STREET RECREATION CENTER

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit."

In 1955 Memorial withdrew its support for the integration of the Bolton Street Recreation Center Because of fear and racism. Jesus turned the cross from a symbol of condemnation to a symbol of liberation. Can we through acknowledgement of our collective sins begin to 'balance the equation' with our neighbors, see ourselves through their eyes, and come to reconciliation and liberty for all of us?

Oct. 30, 1955

Vestry votes against using the Bolton St. Center for negro children in spite of the rector's pointing out that the General Convention and World Council of Churches and Lambeth Conference all oppose segregation.

Let us pray.

O God, you know us to be set in the midst of so many and great dangers, that by reason of the frailty of our nature we have not always stood upright: Grant us such strength and protection to tell the truth about our past and to embrace a new future. Support us in all challenges that may arise, and carry us through all temptations; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.


#### FOURTH STATION

### JESUS MEETS HIS AFFLICTED MOTHER COLONEL CHARLES MARSHALL -- LANVALE HOUSE

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Is it nothing to you, all you who pass by? Look and see if there is any sorrow like my sorrow: For these things I weep; my eyes flow with tears; for a comforter is far from me, one to revive my courage: My eyes are spent with weeping; my stomach churns, my heart is wrung within me; my children are desolate, for the enemy has prevailed.

Colonel Marshall was Robert E. Lee's Aide De Camp, and the author of both the terms of surrender and 'General Order #9' - Lee's final instructions to the Confederate Army. An eloquent man of letters, Marshall typifies the reputation of Bolton Hill at the Turn of the Century. Eloquent, intelligent southern sympathizers who fully embraced the 'lose cause' of the South and had no qualms about advocating for segregation, Jim Crow and the superiority of the White Race.

Lord Jesus Christ, whose Blessed Mother watched your passion and death in deep sorrow, comfort, we pray you, all those who must stand helpless while those they love suffer. Hear the cry of all victims of terror and abuse, give hope and solace to those who are bereaved. Grant that we may use such strength as we have to comfort, support, and protect all who grieve or are in need, for your tender mercies' sake. *Amen*.

#### **FIFTH STATION**


## THE CROSS IS LAID ON SIMON OF CYRENE 1212 Bolton St -- The Rev. J.H. Green

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you:

Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

The soldiers led him out to crucify him. They compelled a passerby, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus.

In 1920, the Pastor Of Enon Baptist Church attempted to Purchase this home at 1212 Bolton Street. Shortly after purchasing the home, his neighbors conspired to have him evicted for non-payment of taxes (which had been paid) and put his house on the market while he was away on vacation. This was the fourth attempt to integrate Bolton Street and certainly the most egregious. We often lay crosses down on others for our own sins. Do we continue to perpetuate this today?



Let us pray.

O Lord Christ, by whose condemnation we are acquitted, in whose death we have life, and whose cross is our hope, keep us mindful of your boundless love and when we are called, like Simon, to bear the cross, make us to rejoice that we are counted worthy to suffer for your sake and unite what we offer with your perfect sacrifice, through the merits of your eternal redemption. *Amen*.

#### SIXTH STATION

#### A WOMAN WIPES THE FACE OF JESUS THE REV. WILLIAM MEADE DAME

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured. Jesus also suffered outside the city gate in order to sanctify the people by his own blood. Let us then go to him outside the camp and bear the abuse he endured. For here we have no lasting city, but we are looking for the city that is to come.

When we speak of Memorial's history The Rev. William Meade Dame is always mentioned. He was called the Bishop of Bolton Street and beloved by many in the neighborhood. He also was a rabid segregationist and openly advocated for blacks to lose the right to vote and to equal housing. He served in the confederate Army and was known to wear his 'Grays' up and down Bolton Street until his death in 1919. Today we are the visible face of Christ in Bolton Hill. #### SEVENTH STATION

### JESUS FALLS A SECOND TIME PARISH HALL MINSTREL SHOW

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. We proclaim Christ crucified, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

The belief that Blacks were racially and socially inferior was fostered by legions of white and performers in blackface. Minstrel show entertainment included imitating black music and dance and speaking in a "plantation" dialect. From 1840 to 1890, minstrel shows were the most popular form of entertainment in America. Memorial Records show an Active Minstrel troop for at least 30 years. It is no surprise that a racist congregation would include them as a church social event. Certainly, our church "did

#### **EIGHTH STATION**

### JESUS MEETS THE WOMEN OF JERUSALEM BOLTON HILL'S CONFEDERATE WOMEN'S MONUMENT

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him. But Jesus turned to them and said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For the days are surely coming when they will say, 'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed.' Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?"

From the April 24th, 1903 Baltimore Sun Article about the unveiling of the Confederate Women's Monument: "Mrs. D. Giraud Wright (1632 Park Ave) President of the Maryland Daughters announced at social meeting of the Baltimore Chapter...The Strains of Dixie will mark the formal opening of the program, and following this the invocation by the Rev. William M. Dame, Chaplain of the Maryland Daughters of the Confederacy."



Let us pray.

Lord, grant us to repent of all cruelty and disregard of which we are guilty of in our own lives and in our common lives as parishioners and residents in this neighborhood. Lord, be our confidence that looking past our past hatred and indifferences we may stand together in order to accomplish your loving purposes, through Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

# NINTH STATION JESUS FALLS A THIRD TIME MT ROYAL SCHOOL

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Those who were my enemies without cause have hunted me like a bird; they flung me alive into a pit and hurled stones on me; water closed over my head; I said, "I am lost." I called on your name, O LORD, from the depths of the pit. Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD. Lord, hear my voice.

#### FROM THE DECEMBER 11, 1960 BALTIMORE SUN

'Interviews with parents in recent weeks pointed up an ambivalent attitude toward the school. While they supported it in theory, many were sending their children to independent or parochial schools. More than half of Mt Royal's 800 students are negroes.' ' "I hoped all summer long to send my boy to the school..but I can't sacrifice our child. There would be have been no one in his class with whom he was congenial." "It is a good school. It has excellent teachers. But my sons associates mean something." '

#### **TENTH STATION JESUS IS STRIPPED OF HIS GARMENTS** THE MOUNT ROYAL PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross.

#### TO EXTEND AREA

#### Blocks Have Captains and Lieutenants.

Practically the whole Mt. Royal avenue area has entered into agreements permanently binding property owners, so that properties cannot be sold to colored people.

I his is the statement of the Mt.
Royal Improvement Association in a letter sent out to persons living in adjoining neighborhoods urging them to pay two dollars, join the association and take part in the "worth white project" of keeping Negroes out.
The 100 per cent white area claimed by the association is bounded by Mt. Royal avenue on the East, Eutaw place on the West, Dolphin street on the North.

The association says it has grown This is the statement of the Mt.

The association says it has grown from 75 per cent to 100 per cent effective since 1919.

946 Sign According to the association's lefter, the properties in the whole territory that have signed for, have been increased from 448 to 946. In the early 1900's fear of a 'negro invasion' gripped white neighborhoods in Baltimore, none more so than the Mount Royal District. To protect itself, members of Memorial founded the Mount Royal Protection Association in Memorial's parish hall, recruiting almost 1,000 households to sign restrictive covenant agreements in the neighborhood.

# ELEVENTH STATION JESUS IS NAILED TO THE CROSS MARBURY AND MCMECHEN

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." One of the criminals who was hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

In 1910 George McMechen, one of the first Black Lawyers in Baltimore, purchased a home on McCullough Street. He was the first Black man to move onto McCullough, something that was viciously opposed by William Marbury, a prominent Baltimore Lawyer, Vestry Member of Memorial and a Bolton Hill Resident - living at the corner of Park and Lanvale. This opposition led to the drafting of a housing segregation ordinance, the first in the country - declaring that white blocks must stay white, and black blocks must stay black.

# TWELFTH STATION JESUS DIES ON THE CROSS MEMORIAL APARTMENTS

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. At that moment the curtain of the Temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split.

Memorial Apartments (now Linden Park Apartments) was the first public building in the Neighborhood that was not restricted either legally or economically by race. It was, from the beginning, a fixed income senior housing facility for people of all races and creeds - so that everyone who lived in the immediate vicinity would be able to stay close to home even after they could no longer keep up with a four story house on park avenue or a third floor walk up on Bolton St. It is in many ways the death of Segregation in Bolton Hill. Just as in Christ's death we are given life, so in the putting to death our addiction to racism and segregation - our neighborhood has been given new life.



By your death, O Lord, we are given life; grant that we may receive this great gift with awe and humility, and let our lives be no longer our own, but yours, now and to the day of eternity. *Amen*.

# THIRTEENTH STATION THE BODY OF JESUS IS PLACED IN THE ARMS OF HIS MOTHER THE BAPTISMAL FONT

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Many women were also there, looking on from a distance; they had followed Jesus from Galilee and had provided for him. Among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James and Joseph, and the mother of the sons of Zebedee. What can I say for you, to what compare you, O daughter Jerusalem? To what can I liken you, that I may comfort you, O virgin daughter Zion? For vast as the sea is your ruin; who can heal you?

In 1969 Memorial called a new rector, the Rev. F. Lyman 'Barney' Farnham. On his first service in the Church he invited to preside with him at the altar The Rev. Forrest Smith, pastor of Sharpe Street Methodist Church - the oldest black congregation in the city. Shortly thereafter he welcomed the first black members of the congregation - setting out quickly to right historic wrongs and to offer hope and resurrection to all. Just as Christ was returned to his mother, so we can all be returned to right relationship with God our Mother if we can put aside our own needs and seek first God's will.

#### Installation Set For Minister

The Rev. Lyman Farnham will be installed as rector of the Memorial Episcopal Church at Bolton street and Lafayette avenue pext Thursday at 8 P.M. with the Rt. Rev. Harry Lee Doll: Episcopal Bishop of Maryland; officiating at the special evensong service and preaching the sermon.

Clergymen from various denominations will take part. Father Farnham assumed his duties at the church on Febru-

ary 1.

The Rev. Alan H. Gee, rector of St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church, will participate in the service, and the psalms will be ready by the Rev. Clinton C. Gleon, associate minister of the neighboring Brown Memorial Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Forrest Stith, of Sharpe Street Memorial United Methodist Church and the Rev. A. Hugh Diskinson of Christ Eniscopal

# FOURTEENTH STATION JESUS IS LAID IN THE TOMB "Tribute"

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

My soul is full of troubles, and my life draws near to Sheol. I am counted among those who go down to the Pit; I am like those who have no help, like those forsaken among the dead, like the slain that lie in the grave. You have caused friend and neighbor to shun me, and my companions are in darkness.



In 2020, Memorial Episcopal Church commissioned this work of art to honor the families enslaved by the founding Rector of this parish, including Hattie Cromwell and her family, center, the ancestor of our present deacon the Rev. Natalie Conway.

I invited you now to pause and contemplate your own experience with race and racism - here in Baltimore and throughout your life. Have you benefited from the white protectionism that has surrounded Bolton Hill? How have you, intentionally or unintentionally, continued the practices of racism that defined this

neighborhood for so long? How can we as a neighborhood and as a parish atone for the past sins of racism and work to undo the systemic inequality that persists to this day?

When we speak about reparations at Memorial we speak about repairing the breach. We seek to heal relationships, develop trust, heal rifts between communities and neighborhoods, and atone for the sins of the past. Where is their brokenness in your life? Where is there a rift that needs healing?

**Let us pray.** Lord Christ, as your body was laid in a tomb, you descended into hell, to break its ancient doors and free those held in its grasp; give to us, and all the faithful departed release from sin and the torment of separation from you, for you are mighty to save, now and for ever. *Amen*.
